Cuts will hurt

State funding for libraries will be automatically cut once again next year unless lawmakers take action.

A temporary increase to restore a portion of lost funding will expire in July when the state budget ends. Libraries want legislators to make the increase permanent to prevent further losses. By 2010, cuts had cost libraries nearly 23 percent of their funding. Today, libraries receive about 16 percent less from the state.

Hear the story of "the golden age of shipbuilding" on the Vermilion River when Bob Reese talks on Monday, Nov. 14 at 7 pm.


Reese, a local resident who has researched Vermilion's boating history, will share tales of Vermilion's sailing ships and the people who built them, as well as the history of its lighthouse.
